Financial Report

As of November 3, the date of the most recent bank statement as of this writing, our congregation has \$33,069 in available funds. This is the amount of money in our checking account less the amounts set aside for designated interests, such as the building fund, sanctuary fund, Thrivent... We ended 2022 with \$11,000 in available cash. In 2023, we were able to increase our cash balance during the first six months because we were not paying a full time pastor. By June 2023, our balance was \$47,406. Now that we have returned to normal expense levels, we are spending more than we are taking in. I project that we will have a negative amount in available funds by the summer of 2024 unless our operating income increases. I encourage you to give what you can, keeping in mind the good works that our congregation does. This can be done in many ways, including online giving. From the Pastor's Desk I'm pretty sure that one of the most

popular questions throughout the land in Lutheran churches this time of year is "Why aren't we singing Christmas hymns already? They're so pretty and cheerful." Well, to answer the question, reason number one is that you have a mean pastor. She might look sweet, but don't be fooled. The second reason is that our hymns are supposed to fit the gospel and other readings of the day. Are you hearing cheery stories of Jesus' birth during Advent? We get things like "But in those day, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken," If this is our most exuberantly happy day, I think we need to look at how we define "fun." Third, and this might sound amazing, but Christmas isn't nearly so pleasurable without all of the waiting. Once upon a time in a land far, far away, I used to work for Harry and David, and then its sibling company, Jackson and Perkins. I worked in merchandising. Merchandising was the people who decided what to buy and how much, how much catalog space it got, what to charge for it, when to put it on sale, and all that. We were in charge of the company's merchandise. Our companies were hugely dependent on Christmas to have a successful year. If I recall correctly, seventy percent of our annual sales would come during the Christmas season. Christmas would make us or break us. As a result, if you worked there, you ate, breathed, and slept Christmas. All company computers would start up with a message about how many days there were until Christmas, every single day of the year. We had to present our boards with our ideas for the Christmas catalog in January and the rest of the year was spent fine tuning your holiday shopping experience. By the time my boss let me go early on Christmas Eve at 2 PM, I was sick of Christmas. Without anything else, without any lows, without any ordinary time, Christmas was too much. Any meaning was lost and it was simply something to get through. When it was all cheerful tunes, they stopped being so cheerful. And finally, all that happiness, without any darkness, without any waiting, is not how life is. We have moments of brightness, happy togetherness, and real pleasure, but we have a whole lot of time that is not like that. Some days

are dark, some days are hard, some are sad, angry, frustrating, and some seem like they're altogether too much for us. Even life in Christ is not always a bed of roses. Challenges, troubles, and sorrows still come our way. The world can still be a very dark place, just look at the news. The darkness in this world is all too real. It's not just a philosophical construct out there. It's numbness when one hears the evening news. It's a sensation that threatens to crush your soul when such tragedy enters your own life. Despair, apathy, and inaction are so easy in the face of it all. What can one person do in the face of it all? How can one alter centuries or millennia of trouble? What do we do when the darkness is pressing in? When it seems too great for us to fight? When each new thing seems worse than the last? Pretending it doesn't matter or papering it over with a cheery song doesn't seem the thing to do. Sometimes, in the church, we live in the darkness. We sing the songs in minor key and acknowledge where we are, that there is suffering and pain, that we don't have all the answers, and the darkness is pressing in.

But we don't stay eternally in the dark. Our answer is not despair. It is not to give up, to stop trying. Our answer is the fine thread of hope, our sure and certain hope in the resurrected Christ. As Jesus says in Mark, "But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates."

No matter how much the darkness presses in, the darkness does not have the final word, but rather a light comes into the darkness, a light that the darkness cannot put out. Just as Christ came into the world in human flesh, Christ will come again. Christ will come as the just judge, who rights what has been wronged, who restores that

which has been taken, who champions those whose voices have been lost. Darkness and despair are not the end.

In Advent, we wait, not for darkness, for a crushing end, but what comes after darkest midnight. We wait through the gray hours for the slow dawn of a new day. And that is what we are called to live in, not in the despair of darkness, but in anticipation of the light. There is a quote attributed to Martin Luther, though he likely never said it. "If I knew that tomorrow was the end of the world, I would plant an apple tree today." Well, whoever said it, they were on to something. We are called to live in hope of a future that is past the end. We are called to plant seeds, even if we are never to see them grow. We are called to live for a future that we cannot create, but one that God creates. We are called not to despair, but anticipation.

It is easy to be lulled by the darkness, but we are called to resist, to keep awake through the darkest hour. We are called, not simply to see the darkness, but also to witness the dawn of blazing light. We are called to keep up our work, even when we can't see the reward, in hope of the future, in light of God's promises. Despair is something we ought to be used to as Christians. Every year we remember the death of Christ upon the cross. We hear of the disciples' despair. We witness their struggle in their darkest hour. But we know what comes next. We know about the empty tomb and we're reading the story in the light of the resurrected Christ. In our own times, things may grow darker, but there is no darkness too dark for hope. We await Christ's coming again with glad anticipation.
